

NAW Member Survey:

Do you use UPS as a carrier in your transportation operation?

- Most NAW members surveyed said they depend on UPS as a carrier in their transportation operations.

What percentage of your inbound and/or outbound shipments are handled by UPS?

- Most NAW members surveyed said UPS handles fifty to one hundred percent of their inbound and/or outbound shipments.

Describe how a nationwide UPS worker strike of 1 -15 days would impact your operations:

- Most NAW members surveyed said they would see a significant short-term impact on their operations.

Under the Taft-Hartley Act, the President can intervene to end a nationwide UPS worker strike by declaring a national emergency. Would you support such an action by President Biden if a strike were to occur?

- Most of the NAW members surveyed said they would support the President using his authority to declare a national emergency to end a nationwide UPS worker strike.

What NAW Distributors are saying:

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- UPS strike would delay deliveries to rural areas and disrupt emergency critical repair parts delivery.
- The last mile consumer deliveries part of the business will be most affected.
- There will be delayed shipments & Project builds.
- Distribution teams could see a reduction in pay, and there could be possible layoffs and delayed delivery to customers, and the bottom line will take a hit.

- We will likely see massive short-term increases with local parcel services, and securing back orders from suppliers will be a significant challenge.
- The residential deliveries to consumers buying from our E-Commerce partners will be the most affected.
- Customers may experience delays in receiving shipments and increased delivery costs.
- There will be a significant impact on receipt of the product. While we carry significant inventory, 10% of our products are special orders with short lead times expected. Inventory turns are relatively high, we would experience product outages on essential fast-moving items, significantly impacting our customers.

Distribution Product Line Impacts:

- Our **equipment repair parts** ship via UPS, which supports 100% of our sales. Repairs are the profitability in our industry. Without repair parts, our independent dealers cannot do their job and provide repair parts.
- For businesses like **healthcare**, this could be critical. The ripple impact of an extended strike would significantly impact all US businesses.
- It would prevent us from supplying customers with critically needed maintenance parts. We try to 'Keep America running.' Being unable to ship the 5000 or so parcels daily via UPS would significantly impact our customers!
- It will likely delay the delivery of inventory products used by critical **aerospace and defense** contractors.
- We are an **electronic component distributor**. A strike would have a harmful impact. Customers are manufacturers and are already worried about not having parts to continue producing.
- We sell **maintenance repair products**, and this will hinder the customer's ability to continue to repair equipment & facilities and our ability to replenish our inventory.
- We are in the **book distribution business**, and a strike would have a massive impact on the industry. There are no real mitigation options. UPS is too big of a factor in the book industry.
- Hardgoods deliveries from our distribution centers and branches to our customers will severely impact our customer's ability to run their business. Our customers include automakers, their support businesses, national defense contractors, airlines, and trucking companies.
- Appliances will not be repaired if a strike takes place. Many homeowners and technicians receive repair parts from 'Parts distributors' and manufacturers via parcel delivery. Non-UPS carriers cannot keep up with the volume of packages if UPS strikes.

Carrier Impact -

- If alternative carriers cannot pick up the additional business, a UPS strike would be crippling in the short term and cost significant revenue.
- In our market, alternative carriers have operational problems, so they are not a solid option for contingency planning. If a UPS strike happens, we believe it will cripple USPS operations, making them unreliable.

- E-commerce customers will be severely impacted by online order delivery. There will be a significant delay for inbound products to inventory from smaller vendors.
- Distributors relying on UPS can only process a small portion of their average shipment volume, resulting in customers running low on the crucial supplies needed to run their business.
- Given the UPS market share, all carriers will likely see significant volume increases, slowing down the US parcel delivery network.
